Many of you who have been members for some time will remember one of the most meaningful and uplifting programs of NMAER and were sorry to see it lapse. It was an effort on the part of NMAER to ensure that the next generation would not only follow in our footsteps but learn and improve on the future of education. And, as the title says, we're happy to tell you: "The Future is Now!" and the Scholarship Program is back!!

Here's how it happened:

In late May 2024, Glorianna Atencio, Director of the Espanola Education Association, contacted the NMAER State Office indicating that the Association was dissolving, and they wished to provide a donation to NMAER. Over the course of the next four months, negotiations took place between Glorianna Atencio, Director, her attorney Keely Simmonds, NMAER Executive Director, Russell Goff, to make it happen. The week prior to the NMAER State Convention, it all came together. After the agreement was reviewed and signed off by the State President and Executive Director the week prior to the NMAER State Convention, a check for \$106,000 was received at the NMAER Office to fund the NMAER Scholarship Program beginning in 2025.

The agreement stipulates that "the funds received by NMAER shall be used solely for the purpose of funding need-based scholarships for New Mexico

students who are applying to undergraduate, master's, PH. D programs or trade schools."

On Friday evening, September 27, 2024, we were honored to announce the donation and to recognize Glorianna Atencio for this outstanding gift at the 81st NMAER State Convention in Las Cruces. Glorianna has been a long-time member of the Espanola Valley Association of Educational Retirees, and it was very moving to listen to her presentation. In her honor, she was presented with a bouquet of flowers and given a standing ovation.

In January 2025, the NMAER Executive Board will vote on recommendations and processes to be used as we provide scholarships for the 2025-26 School Year.

Please join us in expressing our gratitude and thanks to Glorianna... with her support, we will move forward to ensure the success of the new Scholarship Program!

REFLECTIONS ON THE 2024 STATE CONVENTION

After the “80 Years and Soaring” State Convention of 2023, we convened in Las Cruces, New Mexico to chill out and celebrate the eighty-first state convention of 2024. “Chile-ing’ in Las Cruces” turned out to be just that – a time to chill out, but also reflect and enjoy the many opportunities our organization offers its retirees.

From the “Welcome to Las Cruces” by our Unit president, Lois Visage, and the “farewell and safe journey home,” members and their guests left with smiles that indicated the 2024 NMAER State Convention was a success.

As you are aware, the state convention is one way for NMAER to keep us informed and knowledgeable about our retirement benefits. And the presentations during the 2-day meetings provided a wide range of important and useful information for retirees. For purposes of brevity, I will only highlight two of those reports:

The Educational Retirement Board (ERB) had an interesting report. Of major importance to retirees were changes made by the State Legislature. An example, the “return to work” 12-month layout was sunset in 2024, but retirees can still “RTW” under the current 90-day layout. The program will also sunset in 2025, unless the law is extended legislatively. Did you know that ERB has a whopping 45,000 plus retired members?

Another piece of great news is that the ERB Fund has grown by \$849 thousand dollars over a one-year period.

The Retiree Health Care Authority (NMRHCA) provides health care coverage to retirees of state agencies and eligible public entities. The legislature

established NMRHCA in 1990 to provide health care for non-Medicare and Medicare-eligible retirees and their dependents as well as dental, vision, and life insurance. Approximately 302 public entities (including cities, counties, universities, and public and charter schools) participate in NMRHCA. Currently the Authority provides coverage to approximately 64,000 retirees and their dependents. If you paid into NMRHCA during employment and you have questions regarding your health or life insurance benefits, you may contact them at 1 (800) 233-2576.

Other highlights of the State Convention included: The Membership Blitz – four Units were recognized – Albuquerque, Raton, Santa Fe, and Taos for their outstanding work in recruiting members to their respective Units and to NMAER.

The Outstanding Unit Members – In 2024 there were eleven members who were nominated by their Unit with the distinction of being “Outstanding.” These energetic and enthusiastic individuals volunteered throughout the year to make their communities, schools, Units, and ultimately New Mexico, a better place to live, work, and enjoy. Every year, NMAER recognizes members for their commitment to serve and volunteer with our organization and their communities.

Other recognition of award recipients is as follows:

- The Harold R. Goff President’s Award was presented to Ms. Cynthia Fusco.
- The Distinguished Service Award was presented to Ms. Evalynne Hunemuller.
- The Community Service Awards and recipients (you can read more about this award in the article titled “Community Service Hours Award” in this newsletter).

The most momentous part of the Annual Banquet was the donation of One Hundred Six Thousand

NMRHCA UPDATE – 2025 LEGISLATIVE SESSION

This message is directed at preparing our NMAER membership to be fully cognizant of NMRHCA's 2025 Legislative Session efforts. To best accomplish this goal, I will share a summary of a NMRHCA staff document, Protecting Retiree Health Care Benefits Fund, which was adopted by its Board of Directors.

For 2025, the plan is to file a joint resolution for the New Mexico Retiree Health Care Authority's health benefits trust fund to be recognized and protected under the New Mexico Constitution since currently the Retiree Health Care Act states that the NMRHCA benefit can be modified or extinguished in the future. The trust fund, currently over \$1.5 billion, resulted from the hard work and effort of many New Mexicans who have been making contributions during their careers with the expectation of having a benefit when they retire.

Just under 66,000 retirees expect to continue to have health care benefits through NMRHCA for which they have already made contributions; and over 93,000 current employees, who have been making contributions, expect to have health care benefits through NMRHCA upon retirement.

Like the pension systems, Educational Retirement Board (ERB) and Public Employee Retirement Association (PERA), who have been successful in passing resolutions constitutionally protecting their retirement trust funds, passing this resolution will constitutionally protect the RHCA fund.

To avoid an existential threat to our retiree health care benefits, introduction and passage of the joint resolution is imperative. By the time this newsletter is published, it is anticipated that the proposed resolution would have been drafted and that the resolution would have been "heard" and considered for possible endorsement by the Investments and Pensions Oversight Committee (IPOC). NMRHCA Executive Director Neil Kueffer, has received a favorable response from Senator Roberto Gonzales,

IPOC Chair, regarding whether he would be willing to sponsor the proposed resolution. Representative Joy Garratt has shared that she would be inclined to carry the legislation in the House.

As NMAER and NMRHCA members, the significance of our role in getting a favorable outcome to the resolution cannot be overstated. To ensure the resolution's passage, we must engage ourselves in the legislative process and make our voices heard.

During the prefiling period, January 2–17, 2025, the resolution can be filed. Once filed and a number assigned, NMAER members and NMRHCA members should follow up with their respective legislators and member legislators of the committees assigned to hear the bill. THE LATEST HAPPENINGS WITH THE EDUCATIONAL RETIREMENT BOARD...

The ERB Investment Report for the month of August 31, 2024, showed the following:

- One-year return of 8.1%, three-year return of 4.7%, five-year return of 8.6 %, ten-year return of 7.5%, and 8.9% since inception.
- The total assets were reported as \$17,484,449,354.00 billion on August 31, 2024.

The ERB Investment report for September was not available as of the writing of this report. On Friday, August 23rd, the Educational Retirement Board held its regularly scheduled meeting. Here are the highlights of that meeting:

- The Board of Trustees heard and approved the 2025 Legislative Proposal.
- The Board of Trustees heard a report on the Alternative Retirement Plan.
- The Board of Trustees heard and approved the 2026 Budget request.
- The Board of Trustees heard and approved the certification of Capital Assets.
- The Board of Trustees heard and approved the disability and retirements from June 1-July 31, 2024: a total of 516.
- The Board heard an update on the new Pension Administration System.
- The Board heard an update on ERB Investments.
- The Board reviewed the NMERB Trustee Self-Evaluation report.
- The Board elected Officers for 2024-2025: Chair Russell Goff, Vice-Chair Mary Lou Cameron, and Secretary Larry Magid.

On Friday, October 25th, the Educational Retirement Board held its regularly scheduled meeting. Here are the highlights of that meeting:

- The Board of Trustees held a retirement ceremony for Monica Lujan, Member Services Division Director.
- The Board of Trustees heard and approved

Board Meeting dates for 2025: February 25, April 25, June 27, August 22, October 24, and December 12.

- The Board of Trustees heard an update on the new facility. Tentative completion is January 2025.
- The Board of Trustees heard and approved Committee Appointments to the following Committees: Alternative Retirement Committee, Audit Committee, Evaluation Committee, and Investment Committee.
- The Board of Trustees heard and approved the disability and retirements from August 1-September 30: a total of 329.
- The Board of Trustees heard a report on ERB investments.

The next ERB Board of Trustees meeting will be held on December 13, 2024, in Albuquerque.

In closing, thank you for continuing to monitor your retirement benefits.

FROM THE DESK OF THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR...

The 81st Annual NMAER State Convention held at the Hilton Garden Inn, Las Cruces is now in the history books. Congratulations go out to Lois Visage and her Planning Committee for a SUCCESSFUL CONVENTION! Our speakers, including Joseph Sanchez, Executive Director of AARP-NM, David Archuleta, Executive Director of NMERB, Neil Kueffer, Executive Director of NMRHCA, and Senator Bill Soules from Las Cruces, provided us with a wealth of information to take back to our Units. A very moving Memorial Service was held on Friday afternoon; and Outstanding Unit Members, Community Service Awards and the President's Award were announced on Friday evening. The highlight of the Convention, as you read on the front page of the newsletter, was the announcement Friday evening of a donation of \$106,000 from the Espanola Education Association to provide funding for our scholarship program starting in 2025. More details on the scholarship program will be available after the first of the year.

You will recall in last year's 30-day Legislative Session, legislation was introduced (SJR 5, Public Employees Trust Fund) to provide constitutional protection for RHCA's Trust fund.

Unfortunately, SJR 5 was defeated in the Senate on a 25-14 vote. This fall, the NMRHCA Board of Trustees has approved plans to once again seek legislative approval to amend the Joint Resolution to provide Constitutional protection for the \$1.57 billion Trust Fund. (See the RHCA article.) On Tuesday, October 29, 2024, the Investment Pension Oversight Committee (IPOC) heard this proposal and had a favorable opinion. This legislation is of major importance to retirees. We need an all-out effort by retirees to pass this legislation. As we prepare for the upcoming Legislative Session, we will provide you with more information. We are planning to have a virtual Legislative Training Session in early January 2025.

We would like to CONGRATULATE the City Different Retired Educators Association on celebrating their 50th Anniversary on Tuesday, September 24, 2024, at the Santa Fe Country Club. Hilario "Larry" Chavez, Superintendent of Santa Fe Public Schools, Dr. Alan Morgan, former Superintendent of the State Department of Education, and Russell Goff, Executive Director of the New Mexico Association of Educational Retirees, were the guest speakers.

Lastly, we had two successful Membership Campaigns this year which resulted in over 128 new Associate Members and 44 new regular members from the campaigns, and a total of over 300 new members to date in 2024. We continue to seek your support in helping us recruit new members, both associate and regular members. This is your future, and we need to continue our efforts to recruit. We would like to recognize the top four Units in these campaigns: 1) Raton/Colfax County AER, 2) Santa Fe/City Different Retired Educators Association, 3) Albuquerque Association of Educational Retirees, and 4) Taos Association of Educational Retirees.

In-Person Meeting of the NMAER Executive Board September 26, 2024
